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

## The Going Out and Good Neighbor Policies

- Both began in the late 1990s and early 2000s
- Policy background
- Policy objectives
- Policy & institutional arrangements- 'the Chinese leviathan'
- The role of energy and mining state-owned enterprises (SOEs)



## Challenges to Going Out & Good Neighbor

- Overseas expansion of distorted incentives and institutional shortfalls
- Chinese state capitalism: the principal-agent/moral hazard problem
- Bureaucratic problems in implementing the two policies
- Powerful SOEs and their vicious competition



## Chinese Energy and Mining Development in SEA

- Investments reached \$13.4 billion; 28% of Chinese FDI to the region in 2014, rising from 9.5% a decade ago.
- Equity finance captured only a fraction of Chinese capital in this sector.
- Debt finance via Chinese foreign aid funds, export credit guarantees, buyer's credits, or direct loans to foreign governments.
- Yet, the value of the total debt-financed projects is difficult to estimate.




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## Chinese Hydroelectric Development Race in Mainland SEA (Mekong Delta Area)




