


Guns to Butter:

Perception of the Economy and Policy Preferences in Russia



- Tradeoff between military and consumer spending: as a country invests more in its military (produces more guns), it must reduce household consumption (butter).
- But under economic stagnation or decline, overall production elevation is infeasible, state has to prioritize guns over butter, and audience costs of such an approach may become unbearably high.




- RAS Survey 2014 vs 2018
- In October 2014, only "justice and statehood" were important for the Russians.
 - 67% thought that "Russia should be a great power with powerful armed forces"
 - 33% emphasized sovereignty
- In May 2018, welfare started to dominate the agenda
 - 51% thought that "Russia must take care of the welfare of its own citizens first and foremost, and the statehood and military power are secondary"
 - 49% thought that "Russia should be a great power with powerful armed forces"

Overall Do You Approve or Disapprove of Vladimir Putin's Actions as President of Russia?




Puzzle

- Do Russians increasingly favor 'butter' over 'guns' under economic strain?
- Two streams of scholarship:
 - rally 'round the flag" effect (Simmel 1995; Coser 1955;
 Woodwell 2007)
 - salience of foreign policy / support for the authorities declines as economic situation worsens (Treisman 2011, Frye 2019; Sherlock 2019)

Rosstat reported on the situation in the Russian economy in the first quarter of 2019. The last three months have been generally bad for the Russian economy. The economic growth rate slowed down to 1% in annual terms.

Based on the estimates, real disposable incomes of Russians in the first quarter of 2019 also have declined for the fifth year in a row. A large number of indicators suggests that the purchasing power of the population is decreasing.

Treatment Design: Positive

Rosstat reported on the situation in the Russian economy in the first quarter of 2019. The last three months have been generally good for the Russian economy. The industrial production index grew by 10% in annual terms.

Based on the estimates, real wages of Russians in the first quarter of 2019 also increased in annual terms. A large number of indicators suggests that the purchasing power of the population is growing.

Treatment Design

- Compare:
 - Negative vs Neutral Prime
 - Negative vs Positive Prime
- T-test, Wilcoxon-Mann-Whitney test
- Ordinal probit/OLS: controls for gender, age, education
- Errors clustered by region
- 90 % confidence level


Hypotheses

- H1: Respondents in negative socioeconomic treatment group prioritize domestic economic issues over assertive foreign policy issues.
- H2: Respondents in negative socioeconomic treatment group are less supportive of the authorities.











Results

Results

- Respondents concerned about the macroeconomic situation in Russia:
 - Less likely to support increased military spending
 - More likely to believe that the state should prioritize domestic over foreign policy agenda
 - Prioritize the country's economic over military might
 - Less inclined to consider Russia a great power
 - Decrease support for the authorities
- The Kremlin's ability to divert public attention from internal problems through the use of "militaristic rhetoric" amid a falling economy is limited
