Peter previously held positions at the State Department in the Bureaus of Counterterrorism and African Affairs as well as the Office of the U.S. Special Envoy for Sudan. On behalf of the State Department, Peter oversaw and coordinated the U.S. strategy to mitigate and end the threat posed by the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) in central Africa from 2011-2014.

Prior to working at the Department of State, Peter worked as a Legislative Assistant for the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Subcommittee on African Affairs. As a Marshall Scholar, Peter received Masters degrees from the University of Oxford and University of Bradford. He studied as an undergraduate at the University of Notre Dame.
