Indicators of Russian success

Huge return on investment for influence campaigns



March 2023

- Success for Russia. Long-term campaign of image transferral changes terms of debate on escalation.
- **Default assumption** that miscalculation => uncontrollable escalation => nuclear exchanges.
- Get out of jail free card for Russia to escape consequences for its actions – and keep the war (mostly) in Ukraine.
- Escalation dominance replaced with escalation avoidance, because "Putin never de-escalates".

Why Putin Will Never Agree to De-escalate

Regardless of Ukraine's counteroffensive, Russia is bracing for a long war.

All this leaves Russia with only the option of de-escalation toward a stalemate, other than nuclear escalation (P7). But experience tells us that Vladimir Putin never de-escalates. Also, Ukraine's interest is to resist slipping into a low-intensity stalemate: dependent as it is on its allies' active and material support and its people's resilience in the face of incredible suffering, it cannot afford to return to a frozen conflict. With a weakened Russia seeking to slow things down, Ukraine will want to press its advantage, which leaves us with nuclear escalation.

The Kremlin statement appeared to stress that President Putin ordered his troops to stop fighting not because he was deescalating - Putin never de-escalates - but because he had listened to an appeal from the head of the Russian Orthodox Church.

- Overt nuclear use by Russia brings no benefits even on the Kremlin's warped scale of success and failure.
