





SMA & INSS PRISM Speaker Series

Between 2020 and 2022, SMA and National Defense University's the Institute for National Strategic Studies' (INSS) PRISM journal held a collaborative speaker series focusing on the non-military elements of national power and the pacing threat of China.

The global order is undergoing tectonic shifts. With these shifts come extraordinary dangers, as well as opportunities. Great power competition, hybrid, and gray zone conflict, weaponization of new technologies, terrorism and fragile states, climate change, and global pandemics: These are among the issues that the National Defense University's journal, *PRISM*, and the Joint Staff's Strategic Multilayer Assessment (SMA) office track. This collaborative speaker series, initiated in September 2020, presents diverse perspectives on these vital issues for 21st century security from thought leaders in the diplomatic, information, military, and economic (DIME) communities.

Within the DIME construct, national and international security professionals often gravitate toward the military component of national power. Less well understood are the diplomatic, informational, and economic elements. In recent decades, the measures of national strength, power, and influence have changed. No longer can they be measured in terms of military strength alone; indeed, military prowess may have declined relatively to the other elements—particularly economic and informational strength.

While the United States may still retain its edge in military power, peer and near peer competitors—in particular China and Russia—are emerging dangerous and sophisticated adversaries. China has emerged from decades of "hiding its strength, biding its time" as an economic leviathan of the first order, with an economy approaching if not surpassing that of the United States. It occupies a leading position with respect to specific strategic sectors and emerging technologies. Russia has developed tactics and practices termed "gray zone" activities that remain below the threshold of armed conflict yet severely compromise US interests, as well as those of its partners and allies.

The *PRISM* journal and the SMA INSS PRISM speaker series align with the National Security Strategy of the United States (2017) and the National Defense Strategy (2018) and thus recognize the China challenge—in its multiple dimensions—as the most pressing national security issue; however, the sessions within this series will focus on the non-military elements of national power (i.e., diplomatic, informational, and economic competition). Superimposing these perspectives in a multilayer assessment informs the comprehensive approach which the complex national security challenges of the 21st century demand.
